Catalog Description including pre- and co-requisites:

A survey of the work of women painters, sculptors, architects, designers, photographers, and craftspersons from earliest times to the present. Woman as image in the visual arts will also be examined as it relates to her role in society. Prerequisites(for art students): ART 100 and ART 101.

This course is transferable to a four-year program in Fine Arts. Students will use both critical thinking and reading skills.
